News from the Mayor



Summer is just around the corner, and it is a great opportunity for all of us to enjoy the quality of life we are privileged to have in Morin-Heights. I am always happy to admire the magnificent landscapes, the beauty of nature and to take advantage of all the cultural and outdoor activities that

are offered to us. I think we need to remember how precious this beautiful environment is and that we need to take good care of it.

I am very proud to mention that we will once again honour our musical heritage with various concerts throughout the summer, especially at Lummis Park. I strongly encourage you to take advantage of them as the quality will be there! Don't miss the Canada Day festivities on July 1st with the band The Box and the duo Seb & Jess. In the case of The Box, it's a comeback since they recorded an album at Studio Morin-Heights in 1986-1987. As for Seb & Jess, it's a duo of local talent; be there! The summer will culminate with the Superfolk Festival and its surprise line-up. If the quality of the artists of the last few years is any indication, the 2023 edition promises to be memorable as the event has taken its stride.

A few words now on the recent land acquisitions authorized by the council since the beginning of 2023. As you are undoubtedly aware, Council began the year by purchasing large lots owned by the Basler family, mainly located within the village core and along the Simon River. We concluded nearly three years of negotiations to acquire various lots, as well as the building located at the entrance of Basler Park. These decisions were well thought out and consistent with Council's strategic vision and the Municipality's new urban plan, which came into effect on February 27th. There were several reasons for this decision: the protection of a natural environment in the heart of the village core, planning of the important wastewater treatment project and the preservation of the recreational trails that run through this land as well as the possibility of carrying out other outdoor activities or an affordable housing project. This is an investment in the sustainable development of the municipality that will benefit all generations of Morin-Heights citizens. I want to remind everyone that the Habitat Morin-Heights project will be built on land adjacent to these newly acquired lots.

Furthermore, we have just acquired the lots of the Congregation of Our Lady of Charity of the Good Shepherd estate located along Route 364 near

Bennett Road. This is another crucial investment made this year and, as I have explained at Council meetings over the past few months, given that we had a right of first refusal on these lots and that a formal offer had been made to the owners, we had to act and make a decision, or we would lose this natural treasure. Those interested in acquiring the land had made it clear that they wanted to develop the property. I am convinced that the \$2.1 million invested is worth much more regarding sustainable development, and this site will once again benefit all present and future generations of Morinheighters. The possibilities for this site are immense and commensurate with its potential for various municipal purposes. We are continuing to reflect on this subject. We will keep you informed via, among other things, our new citizen platform, which I invite you to visit as soon as it is launched to keep you informed of major projects and to participate, in your own way, in municipal life via this new tool for collaboration between the Municipality and its citizens. We are currently carrying out the final tests necessary to ensure the proper functioning of this web platform; our regular site will continue to exist in parallel, and you will be able to visit it at your convenience.

Summer is also a time for major infrastructure work. This year, we will be upgrading all municipal aqueducts, and the Balmoral aqueduct will be undergoing additional work to increase its capacity. We will be doing work on Village Road in front of the IGA grocery store, on Tamaracouta Road, and a final section of Lakeshore Road will also be upgraded. Finally, repairs to the roof of the municipal garage will be required.

I cannot overlook the renovations to the library. Council has authorized an investment of nearly \$275,000 to give our library a facelift and make it more user-friendly and appealing.

Finally, I invite you to take advantage of the summer 2023 recreation program, as there will be something for everyone. We will continue our speed and noise awareness campaign. This year, you will be invited to participate actively and positively to affirm your desire to preserve our quality of life and the biodiversity of our environment.

Above all, enjoy your vacation and special moments with your loved ones. We look forward to seeing you this summer!

A Tribute to Charles Bernard

Our Fire Department and First Responders Chief has decided to take a well-deserved retirement. I would like to take this opportunity to revisit a career dedicated to the service of the population of Morin-Heights.

Charles began his public service in 1987 and 1988 as a municipal councillor, but he found his true calling when he began his career as a firefighter in 1994.

During his early years, he also developed his passion for helping people by becoming a first responder alongside Michel Crevier's ambulance crew. This was the beginning of the 24/7 home scanner, which continues today! As a result, he was always the first to intervene when people were in need. From 2001 to 2004, Charles, often accompanied by his wife Carole, offered the service on a volunteer basis and a little outside the regulatory framework...!

In 2004, his dream became a reality with the creation of the First Responders Service in Morin-Heights. Over the years, he has been able to pass on his passion to other interveners, and our service has become an essential resource for citizens. Charles' passion is so contagious that his wife and daughter eventually also took first responder training!

In 2007, Charles was appointed Director of the Fire Department, and he integrated the training of first responders for the firefighters. We still have about 20 people trained to respond to medical emergencies for the local population.

Throughout all this time, Charles has navigated many situations with brilliance in the beautiful moments as well as the dramas we have experienced together. Whether it was the difficult moments as well as the dramas such as the Order of the Solar Temple event or the roof collapse at the Gourmet du Village, we all relied on him to respond

to emergencies, and he did so with professionalism and thoroughness.

Eleven years ago, Charles, along with Carole, delivered a baby girl before the ambulance arrived, and he held her in his arms all the way to the hospital. This young girl still lives in Morin Heights, and her parents continue to express their gratitude. I am sure many citizens of Morin-Heights also express their gratitude to Charles. One has the impression that when he arrives on the scene of a serious situation, people's nervousness disappears, and they know that everything will be OK. The *Sûreté du Québec* recognized his contribution and even gave him an award for his service to the population.

29 years as a firefighter, 22 years as a first responder, and 16 years as a director, one constant remains: Charles has always been there for all of us, and we owe him our thanks!

Charles, my director, my colleague and my friend, it is time to turn the scanner off...






A new citizen portal!

SEPTIC SYSTEMS

Maintenance of your septic system

For a septic system to function optimally, it must be adequately maintained. A septic system treats domestic wastewater naturally thanks to the bacteria and enzymes in the tank and the purifying element.

What is a septic system?

- The tank (separates solids from liquids and partially decomposes sludge)
- The purifying element (distributes the liquid part, filters it, and finishes the decomposition)

Is too much water harmful?

Too much water on a regular basis can interfere with the proper functioning of the system. Try to stagger your water use to avoid water surges in the septic tank. A water surge occurs when a large amount of water enters the tank quickly, creating turbulence and resuspending solids, which can lead to their carryover to other septic system components. For example, the simultaneous use of the dishwasher, washing machine and shower can create a large and damaging amount of water in the tank.

Why is it necessary to have the tank emptied periodically?

When the accumulation of sludge and scum is too great, the tank's efficiency is significantly compromised, and the material that should be accumulating in the tank is directed to the downstream system, which can lead to premature clogging. Therefore, the septic tank must be emptied according to the **Regulation respecting wastewater disposal** systems for isolated dwellings (see section 13). A residence used year-round requires the sludge and scum to be emptied every two years; a secondary home used seasonally requires an emptying every four years.

Purification field or filtering element

For a purifier to function correctly, it must always be clear. It should not be used as a driveway or parking lot to avoid soil compaction. Trees and shrubs should not be planted near drainage pipes as their roots may clog them. Backfilling, digging, and gardening should also be avoided over the drain.

What can I put in my septic system?


A septic system is designed to receive and break down body waste, toilet paper and grey water, period! Other body wastes, such as condoms, disposable wipes, dental floss, sanitary napkins, etc., should be disposed of with household garbage. Products that can compromise the viability of bacteria, such as abundant bleach, pesticides, herbicides, insecticides, and medications, should be placed elsewhere.

Acceptable for septic tank

- · body waste
- toilet paper
- grey water (from dishes, showers, washing) machine)

Not to be put in!

- disposable wipes, condoms, dental floss, condoms, sanitary napkins
- coffee grounds, grease, and cooking oils
- cigarette butts
- medication, bleach in quantity,
- pesticides, herbicides, insecticides
- solvents, paints





Lawn Watering Standards

According to the following days, lawn watering is permitted only from 3:00 to 6:00 in the morning if water is distributed by automatic watering systems and only from 20:00 to 23:00 if mechanical watering systems distribute water:

- a) **Monday** for the occupant of a dwelling whose address ends in 0 or 1;
- b) **Tuesday** for the occupant of a dwelling whose address ends with 2 or 3;
- c) **Wednesday** for the occupant of a dwelling whose address ends with 4 or 5;
- d) **Thursday** for the occupant of a dwelling whose address ends with 6 or 7;
- e) **Friday** for the occupant of a dwelling whose address ends with 8 or 9.

REHABILITATION OF EXISTING INFRASTRUCTURE, safety first!

Necessary Street Closures

When we talk about «road work», we often talk about «street closures» as well. You can't make omelets without breaking eggs, as they say. Street closures inevitably cause frustration among motorists and require a little patience to navigate the detours. However, they are essential to ensure workers' safety on construction sites.

To replace existing water mains due to the significant depth of such excavation sites, mandatory widths and slopes are required to maintain the integrity of the supporting walls. These trenches, sometimes as wide as the road itself, are necessary to avoid a wall's collapse and reduce the risk of serious injury to workers. It is therefore important to keep calm, smile, and plan your trips accordingly.

A Matter of Safety

Be mindful that flag attendants are crucial in controlling the traffic coming in and going out of construction sites. They are not only safeguarding the security of workers but also the safety of motorists who, sadly, do not always comply with their directives. Let's be respectful and collaborate.

Above all, remember that once the work is completed, these stretches of road will not need to be touched by municipal crews for several years. So why worry about a few weeks of inconvenience when these improvements will provide residents with a better environment for years to come?

Several major projects will be set in motion this summer and continue throughout the fall. The work consists of repairing outdated or damaged infrastructure, such as sections of our water works, roads and sidewalks, and reprofiling ditches for proper drainage.

We cannot repeat it often enough: this regular upkeep is an integral part of our plan to maintain assets in a sustainable manner while improving citizen safety as an added benefit. It goes without saying that carrying out these types of projects over the winter months, as opposed to during warmer months, would significantly increase overall costs due to frost and snow cover.



Outdoor fires

Before building an outdoor fire, follow the rules for an open-air fire. If you use an outdoor fireplace, ensure it is installed correctly.

Open-air fires

An open-air fire is a fire that burns freely, for example, a ground-level campfire.

Before lighting an open-air fire, check with your municipality to see if open-air fires are permitted in your area. Also, check with SOPFEU for any restrictions in effect. If there are no restrictions in your municipality, follow these guidelines:

• Prepare an open area on mineral soil free of combustible materials (leaves, grass, etc.).

- Make sure you have access to a water source (e.g., bucket of water, garden hose) to put out the fire.
- Keep all propane gas cylinders and other combustibles out of reach.
- Keep an eye on the fire at all times and always have water nearby.
- Put out the fire by dousing it thoroughly and stirring the embers.
- Before leaving the premises, make sure there are no heat sources by touching the ashes.

Outdoor fireplaces

If you have a regulatory outdoor fireplace, you can have a fire, even if SOPFEU restrictions are in effect in your municipality. To comply, your outdoor fireplace must:

be installed on a noncombustible surface (gravel, dirt)

AND

be equipped with a spark arrestor with openings no larger than 1 cm.

However, check your municipality's regulations to find out what type of fireplace you can use (stone, brick, or heat-resistant metal).

What to do if an electric wire has fallen to the ground?

Stay at a distance and never use an object to try to move the wire. Even a tree branch can conduct electric current. To report the presence of a wire on the ground, call 911.

Outdoor Network

New Mountain Bike Trail Project

The Club de vélo des Pays-d'en-Haut, Sommet Morin Heights, and the Municipality of Morin-Heights are pleased to announce the development of a new mountain bike trail network.

The project, directed, managed, and operated by the VPDH-SMH Trails Committee, foresees the realization of 13 km of trails, which will be linked to the Basler Park network, where 15 km of bike trails are already accessible.

The opening should be at the end of June; there is still some work to complete. Check our website for the opening date.

Unauthorized Development

Building modules, obstacles or new trails in the mountain bike network is forbidden without the approval of the Municipality.

Hiking

The hiking trail network at Basler Park and Bouleaux Park (snowshoeing trails only) is free for all users. Please note that the winter trails at Sommet Morin Heights **are closed** during summer.

Trail Conditions

You can check the status of the trails on the municipal website: www.morinheights.com/Outdoors. Please respect the 24-hour rule after heavy rain to preserve the trails' condition and respect the signage regarding closed trails.

Parking

Street parking is always prohibited, as well as on private lots adjacent to the parks. It is imperative that you use the municipal parking lots near the various trail networks.

Mountain Biking - Morin-Heights Residents

Access to Basler Park for mountain biking is free for Morin-Heights residents (**on presentation of a valid citizen card).

Respect of private property

It is important to note that the closed trails may be located on private property. Therefore, using them outside of the operating season is **forbidden** since we do not have the necessary authorizations.






